St. Henry hosts Laffalot camp

Program designed to teach kids good sportsmanship while having fun

ST. HENRY — Hayden Boeckman dug in his heels as he geared up to dodge the balls rocketing toward him in the high school gym.

Boeckman, 8, this week joined 18 other first- to sixth-graders at Laffalot Summer Camp, a weeklong program sponsored for the first time this year by St. Henry schools.

More than 1,500 children each

year attend the camp at 50 locations from Northern Kentucky to Toledo.

The program is designed to teach students good sportsmanship while they enjoy a variety of outside and inside activities, said camp leader Mindy Siefring, a physical education and health teacher at St Henry schools.

"We're very excited this year about the participation and hope that next year we'll have even more students," she said, while giving encouraging words to the children playing Siamese soccer.

The camp, held from 9 a.m.-2 p.m., also teaches youngsters how to develop teamwork, build body coordination, improve interpersonal skills and enjoy friendly competition, Siefring said.

Each day the camp offers a different set of games to play

such as field freeze ball, crazy ball, floor hockey and scooter basketball. To add more fun, the students are asked to wear different items of clothing each day — a funny hat, crazy socks or blue or red T-shirts.

Boeckman, soon to be a thirdgrader, was sweaty and thirsty after finishing a soccer game. But after a few gulps of water, he charged into the gym to play dodgeball.

"These are fun," he said, grinning. "But I really like to

play capture the flag the best. I like games. I'm in baseball, basketball and soccer. I guess I like sports."


